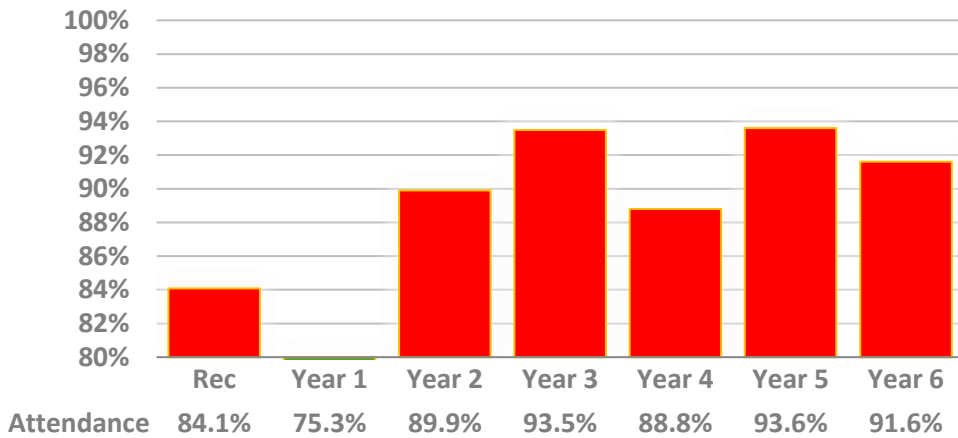
We also took delivery of some wonderful new books that have been safely delivered to each classroom to celebrate Black History Month. (We also have a wonderful display of books in the main entrance.)

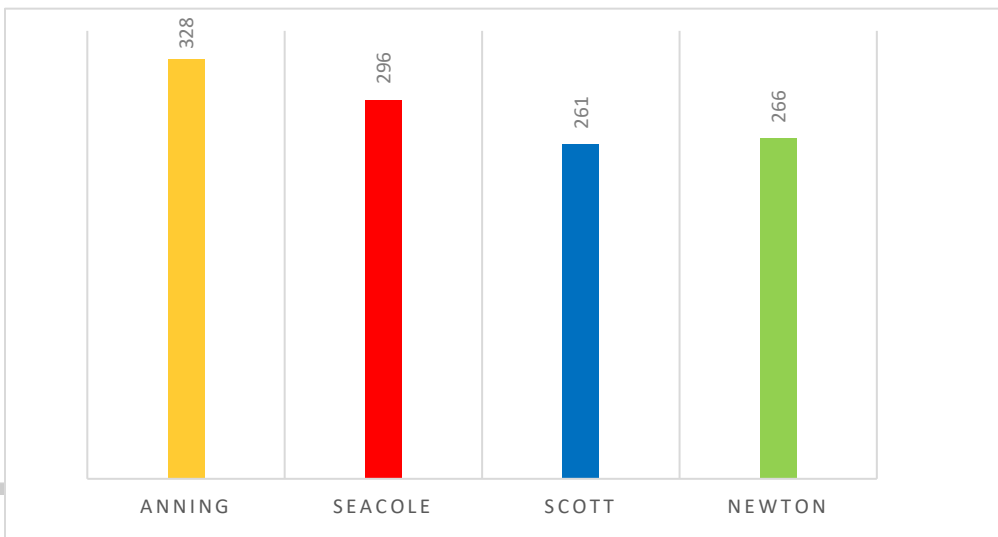

MESSAGES FROM THE TEACHERS & STUDENTS...

Reception

This week in Reception we have been learning all about the story 'The Smartest Giant in Town'. We have enjoyed trying to learn the song from the story and make up some actions to tell the story without having to use the book! We have also been learning about the things we can do to be kind to our friends and family, just like the Giant. In maths we have been comparing different quantities and learning the key vocabulary of 'more' and 'fewer'. Next week your child will be bringing a library book home, please make sure this is in their book bag every Tuesday.

Year 1

This week we have been celebrating Black History and learning about the first female black woman astronaut Mae Jemison. We have been ordering numbers and using the words greater than and less than when putting them in order. Lots of children have been using Jackson Pollock's splatter technique when painting outside and we have enjoyed singing the Solar System songs at the end of every day. Next week we will be talking about the seasons as we move into Autumn and your child will have a Sunrise/Sunset diary that they need to fill in and return to school next Friday.

Year 2

This week Year 2 have been writing up their story and I am so impressed with the speed in which they have progressed since just last Wednesday. Each day has just got better and better! They have begun to edit and improve their writing with their red pens too. For black history month, we have been reading the story of Rosa Parks through Faith Ringgold's beautiful book and have created freeze frames in groups to show the different parts of the story read for our assembly next week. Next week, we will look at Faith Ringgold's art and have a go at making some in our own style ourselves. In science we stretched, twisted, bent and squashed different materials and began to categorise them based on their properties, we pulled a pair of Miss Peters' tights from one end of the room to the other without breaking them, they were so stretchy!



Year 3

All the children in Year 3 thoroughly enjoyed the African Dance workshop and are very excited about today's African Drumming workshop, which forms part of Black History Month. In class the children are researching Marcus Rashford and what he has done for children across Britain. In Maths the children have been using manipulatives to support their learning of adding and subtracting using exchange. During Science the children created a puppet to investigate how shadows change over time

The children are enjoying learning about the strange things that the Romans ate and the clothing that they wore.

Year 4

This week we are celebrating Black History Month and have enjoyed learning about some important figures who have contributed towards improving the lives of many Black people. We kick started our Topic with taking part in an African dance workshop last Friday. All the children thoroughly enjoyed this and showed off some of their impressive hip movements! We are now working on our own performance to show our school next week during our celebration assembly. Year 4 have also been taking part in additional drama in our English lessons to help them understand our text 'Romulus and Remus'. This will support our narrative writing next week. Well done year 4, keep up the hard work...one more week to go until half term! Mrs Mir :)

Year 5

Year 5 have shown resilience this week as we approach the end of this busy half term. During English lessons they have been planning and researching facts to use in their non chronological reports. They have shown a keen interest in this and have used different sources of information well. In Maths the class have continued working on their addition and subtraction skills, focusing on calculations with more than one exchange. The children built on their existing knowledge of the moon during Science lessons, describing the movement of the moon in relation to planet Earth. We have continued to celebrate Black History month by learning to recite Benjamin Zephaniah's poem 'Clever Trevor' and taking part in a fantastic African drumming workshop at the end of the week. Well done Year 5!

Year 6

Y6 have had a great week - especially in enhancing their public speaking skills. In our English lessons the children prepared, participated in and judged a debate on Fairtrade. It was wonderful to see the confidence and hear the passion when they spoke. They were able to judge the debate fairly and provide constructive criticism in a helpful and kind way. They also prepared speeches for Mrs Machingauta and Mr Hingley to become pupil leaders and house captains. I know they were very impressed and almost brought to tears by the quality of the speeches and the confidence that came through when the children presented them!

The children have been learning all about the life of Nelson Mandela and are preparing for their presentation to the school next week for the Black History Month celebration assembly which they are very excited for. They also had an African drumming workshop this morning which they loved.

Y6 have been spending time getting to know MYON and Accelerated reader again after completing their reading assessments. Beginning after half term, we will have a 'reader of the week' and a 'quiz master of the week'.
