Message from the Headteacher:

Our value this half term has been '**Kindness**'. We have looked at kindness in its many forms and have discussed and explored the reasons for kindness and its importance in our every day life. Our pupils are insightful when discussing friendships and kindness and they sometimes seem older than their years. I enjoy it when they make us, as adults, think and reflect. Many of the examples of kindness would be expected from a primary age child, such as 'My friend helped me when I fell over', or 'My friend played with me when I was on my own'. These draw from their own experiences and are valuable. Other examples, such as 'I have encouraged someone in my class when they found their work hard', or 'My friend came with me to talk to my teacher when I was worried about my friendships.' are more considered and show an increasing level of emotional maturity.

We are all, and I do use the word 'we' on purpose, are at different stages of emotional development. We are all living very different experiences. Our lives are very different to each other's. Our pupils are beginning to recognise this. They know that some of us live in flats and some in houses, they know that some of us go hungry, and some of us are more wealthy. Some people are able to process our difficulties and stresses more easily, others find it hard to do this. But one thing remains constant and that is to be kind to each other. We should be kind and respectful to each other. Our determination to look at kindness in its many different forms has had and will continue to have a big impact across the whole school. As parents, we also need to be mindful of the impact we have. We model behaviour, either consciously or subconsciously, and our children

look to us for our responses, especially at time of greater stress. To be kind to each other when we are finding it hard ourselves shows the great human capacity of empathy. Someone might be having a really bad day and actually making sure that they are ok benefits everyone concerned. Remember, a mere smile might make someone's day.

Please could you ensure that you are **arriving at school** within your **allocated time slots**. We still have some parents that are **continually late** dropping off their children. You are able to drop off your children at your **family's earliest drop off time**. As a parent, it is your job to make sure that your child is in school, on time, and wearing the correct school uniform. Please make sure that you are sending your child to school in the correct uniform (**no trainers** unless it is a PE day, **no earrings**). You also need to make sure that you are sending them in with a suitable coat, as well as having a water bottle with them. This is your responsibility as parents and again, you are setting the example for your children.

Many thanks to **Gemma and Simon** who continue to monitor the traffic in Philip Road. Please remember to park at the bottom of the road by the green even when they have gone. I counted about 10 cars this morning arriving after 0850 (some of which include our continual late - comers) , all of whom then performed three point turns at a time when children are still walking up the road. Remember, we are doing this for your children's safety. **Leave a few minutes earlier if you need to and park at the bottom of the road.**

As you know, the lockdown guidance is changing from 29th March. Please find the changes detailed below.

Social contact

The evidence shows that it is safer for people to meet outdoors rather than indoors. And this is why from 29 March, when most schools start to break up for the Easter holidays, outdoor gatherings (including in private gardens) of either 6 people (the Rule of 6) or 2 households will also be allowed, making it easier for friends and families to meet outside.

Business and activities

Outdoor sports facilities such as tennis and basketball courts, and open-air swimming pools, will also be allowed to reopen, and people will be able to take part in formally organised outdoor sports.

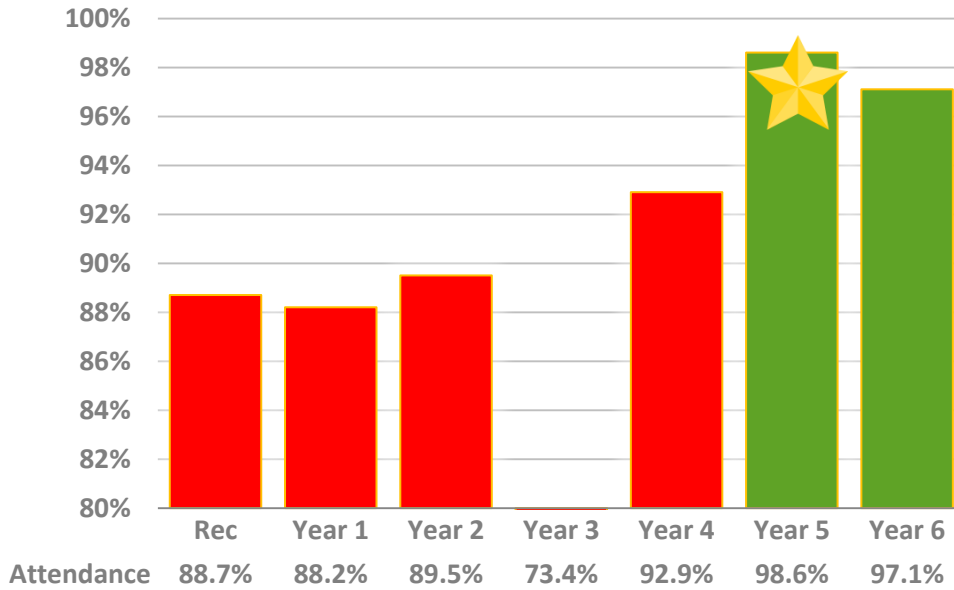
Travel

The 'stay at home' rule will end on 29 March but many restrictions will remain in place. People should continue to work from home where they can and minimise the number of journeys they make where possible, avoiding travel at the busiest times and routes. Travel abroad will continue to be prohibited, other than for a small number of permitted reasons. Holidays abroad will not be allowed, given it will remain important to manage the risk of imported variants and protect the vaccination programme. The government has launched a new taskforce to review global travel which will report on 12 April.

Year 4

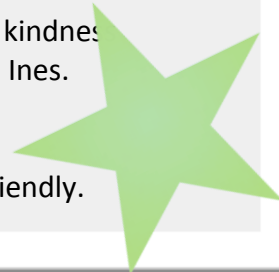
Israa for trying her best during test week as in lessons. She has been putting her hand up more which is great.

RECEPTION

YEAR 2

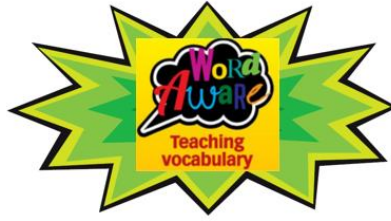
