They have all blown us away with their phonics screenings' this week and have continued to make fantastic progress with their behaviour choices. We continue to be so proud of Year 1 - keep it up!


YEAR TWO Aliza for showing resilience and reaching level 3 in Cracking Times Tables. Well done Aliza for not giving up.

When do I need to submit a leave of absence request?

If your child will be absent, other than for standard medical, dental, orthodontist appointments or musical instrument examinations, you must request a leave of absence, rather than just informing the school that your child will be absent. This should be done at least 4 weeks in advance and not on the day of the absence. The leave of absence request form must berequested from the office and be from a parent/legal guardian, not from a third party, e.g. a Scout Leader, External Sports Coach. The absence will then be considered by a member of the senior leadership team and you will be informed of the outcome within 5 school days. Leave of absence taken without authorisation may result in prosecution proceedings or a Fixed Penalty Notice.

MESSAGE FROM THE TEACHERS AND STUDENTS

RECEPTION

This week in Reception we have been busy continuing our learning about creatures that live in a rockpool and using our story map to retell our story - Sharing a Shell. We have also introduced a new maths aid to help us with our counting called a Rekenrek. We have been learning how to move the beads in the right direction and how to reset it after every use. Thank you for your support in sending your children in with sunhats and applying sun cream in the mornings. If your child has not got a sunhat, please purchase

YEAR ONE

In Year 1 this week we have had lots of fun in English learning about our new story 'Dinosuars and all that rubbish'.

We have used our adjectives to describe our characters and what they have been up to in our story sequencing

and have finished our week off by acting out our story in groups. In Maths we continued to learn about multiples and division and have had lots of fun sharing counters and cubes equally. In History we got a bit messy making our very own salt dough fossils and in Science this week we had to draw around our friends on the playground and label our main body parts. Yellow Homework books have been sent home today with this week's spellings and Mathletics is still available online.

YEAR TWO

We have had a busy week in Year 2 and the children have been working extremely hard in the heat! In English the children have continued their topic based around the book 'The Secret of the Black Rock'. They acted out key parts from the story in groups, wrote questions to ask the main character and came up with adjectives to help them write character descriptions. In Maths, the children finished their topic on fractions by learning how to find three quarters and how to count up fractions to make a whole. In science, the children completed a really interesting investigation! They explored what condition was the most suitable for a woodlice. They split a tray into 4 sections (wet black paper, dry black paper, dry white paper and wet white paper), collected a woodlice

from outside and observed which section that their woodlice went to. The majority of the class found out that woodlice prefer damp and dark conditions. In history, the children started looking at famous pirates. They chose one of these pirates and made a 'Wanted' poster for them. They used the method of 'tea staining' to make their work like it was from a long time ago. The children really enjoyed this lesson! Well done on a great week Year 2.

YEAR THREE

Another busy week in Year 3. In Maths we are learning Time. Pupils are reading analogue clocks to tell the time to the minute. If you have a spare clock at home, the pupils would love to keep learning how to tell the time. In English we are on our new story 'Charlie and the Chocolate factory', the children are really enjoying it. They had to write a character description of Charlie and they were coming up with some really good adjectives to do this. In Science, we are looking at the topic Forces and

Magnets. In topic, the students are creating a poster about why Vitamin C is important, following on from them

learning about James Lind. It is important that students read at home so please keep doing this and writing in their planners. Mathletics is a really good maths tool, this helps develop their learning alongside what they have been doing in class, I am encouraging parents to please support the pupils doing this at home. If this isn't possible or they don't have their logins, please let me or the office know. Another week down, looking forward to next week. Miss Stickland

YEAR FOUR

YEAR SIX


